# **Who's Next?** Activists Become Targets in the Struggle for Resources – and Rights

In Boston, where Grassroots
International has its
headquarters, it's not uncommon
for an outstanding activist to receive
a civic award for protecting a water
source or blowing the whistle
on a misbehaving corporation.
Unfortunately, our partner
organizations aren't so lucky.

From Brazil to Palestine, committed activists are increasingly more likely to receive a bullet than an award for their good works. Anyone who dares to stand up and fight back to oppose the global grab for scarce resources has become a target for violence.

Since 1983, Grassroots has supported some of the most progressive social movements around the world, offering both financial and political solidarity in their struggle to secure a dignified life. Yet today these movements face increasing violence from forces that will stop at nothing in their reckless pursuit of profit and "progress."

In response to this alarming trend, Grassroots International is mobilizing funds from its network of generous donors to do everything in our power to put a stop to it.

Land and resources are harder to

take when they are being effectively utilized by communities. So, stabilizing the livelihoods of hardworking families – and growing strong, stable local economies – is one way Grassroots International is working to advance community rights.

At the same time, we support the organizing efforts of partners in Latin America, Africa, Asia, the Middle East – and beyond – as they lobby for fair farm and trade policies and advocate against resource grabs.

And when our allies are persecuted for their work – sadly, it's usually a question of "when" and not "if" – we help to raise awareness about their struggles and connect them with allies across the globe for legal defense and security.

Because supporting the legal rights of our partner communities is a fundamental part of our work, Grassroots International awards grants to a number of organizations whose sole purpose is to defend those who engage in resource rights activism; to document human

rights abuses; and to protect individuals involved in social justice movements.

And despite incredible odds, there have been many successes to celebrate.

Efforts supported by Grassroots International were critical to suspending plans for one of the world's largest dams in the Brazilian Amazon. Meanwhile, our partnership with the MST (Landless Workers Movement) has helped

thousands of impoverished families in Brazil to reclaim their land and livelihoods. And in Nicaragua La Via Campesina's Global Campaign to End Violence against Women succeeded in passing landmark legislation.

### Letter from the Director · · · · ·

There are some phone calls and emails from our partners that we never want to get. And over the last couple of years, they have come more frequently: Word of assassinations of human rights activists, unlawful arrests of farmers and youth choosing to stay on their own land, death threats against agrarian reform campaigners.



And for all of us at Grassroots International, those people have names. Cicero Guedes, a member of the Landless Workers Movement in Brazil, shot more than a dozen times while he rode his bicycle to the fields. Evelinda Miranda, a 25-year-old Mayan organizer with the national Women's Commission of La Via Campesina, murdered along with seven other community members opposing a mining operation in Guatemala. Dr. Moayad Ahmad Bisharat, coordinator of the Jericho office of the Union of Agriculture Work Committees in Palestine, abducted from his home by Israeli forces. Rafael Alegria, a leader of La Via Campesina and advocate for agrarian reform in Honduras, facing death threats and forced into hiding after the murder of his closest advisor.

The names are many, and each one affirms the work that we do at Grassroots International. We know that the main struggle today is for the power to control the world's resources – land, water, minerals, and food. And the strongest voices for the people, for sustainability and equality come from our partners.

That's why Grassroots International supports more than seeds-and-tools for small farmers and indigenous peoples. We accompany that support with a dogged commitment to defend human rights – and to provide much needed financial and political backing to those on the front lines of efforts to protect the rights to land and water, food sovereignty and climate justice.

The stakes have never been higher. And we remain stalwart in our alliance with those who protect not only their own land but work for the rights of all to a dignified life.

Like our global partners – and like our thousands of U.S. supporters – Grassroots International is resolved to carry forward the banner, in the names of Cicero, Evelinda and all who stand up for justice. Thank you for joining us in this vital work.

Yet, amidst the successes, there is also tragedy and heartbreak – stories that belie a violent struggle against powerful and ruthless adversaries.

Cicero Guedes was one recent victim. A former sugar cane cutter turned land rights activist with the MST, Cicero was murdered – shot more than a dozen times while riding his bicycle to the fields. His assassination, along with thousands of other murders carried out since the MST began its work more than two decades ago, sends an ominous message to other would-be land rights activists: organize, and you will pay the ultimate price.

The governments of the developing countries in which our partners work are betting heavily on foreign investment and megaprojects — grand infrastructure to tie them into the global economy. Our partners are in the way. They aren't anti-development, but they do stand in the way of "progress" that doesn't advance the interests of people or the environment on which we all depend.

It is a giant clash of values that will have a profound impact on our world and its future. With so much money at stake and available resources quickly diminishing, tensions are likely to escalate.

Yet even in the face of such ominous threats, we cannot back down. That's why Grassroots International has created mechanisms like the Presente Fund, which enables us to respond to the urgent need for human rights defense, wherever it arises.
